Advocacy refers to the act or process of supporting a particular cause or proposal and encompasses three main types: Self Advocacy, Individual Advocacy, and Systems Advocacy. ***NHU is allocating resources toward creating educational material focused on Self-Advocacy as well as Systems Advocacy.***

Why You Should Care about Medicaid Funding

The proposed reduction of \$880 billion in Medicaid funding is anticipated to have far-reaching consequences for cities across the United States. In Wisconsin specifically, this significant cut will disrupt the operations of numerous businesses, including medical clinics, nursing homes, and various healthcare facilities that rely heavily on Medicaid reimbursements to serve their communities effectively.

Furthermore, Medicaid funding plays a crucial role in supporting the workforce dedicated to helping individuals with disabilities and older adults live independently in their own homes, rather than being confined to hospitals or institutional settings. A reduction of this magnitude could jeopardize the livelihoods of hundreds of thousands of caregivers and healthcare professionals, potentially leading to severe job losses across the country. These workers are indispensable in providing quality care and ensuring that vulnerable populations receive the support they need.

It's important to note that Medicare coverage is limited in scope; it only pays for the first 100 days of care in a skilled nursing home. After those initial days, where do patients turn for assistance? That's where Medicaid, which is administered by each individual state, steps in to cover the costs associated with long-term care. This becomes particularly significant when we consider that, on average, individuals at the end of their lives spend approximately 13.7 months in long-term care facilities. As such, Medicaid is not merely a program for the elderly and disabled—it is a vital lifeline for nearly every American citizen, reinforcing its critical role in our healthcare system.


"I became disabled at two years old, so I've only known being disabled my whole life. I think one thing that is super important, and something my parents did an awesome job with, is that they didn't expect less of me.

I grew up on a farm, and I remember as a kid they were just like "here are the cows you need to milk." I would need to figure out how to push through the rocky fields. They encouraged me to problem solve, and learn for myself, to what extents my disability does limit me, and where I need to ask for help, versus just doing everything for me."

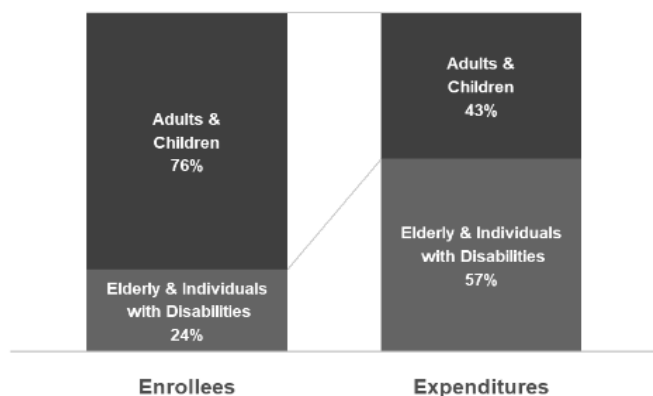
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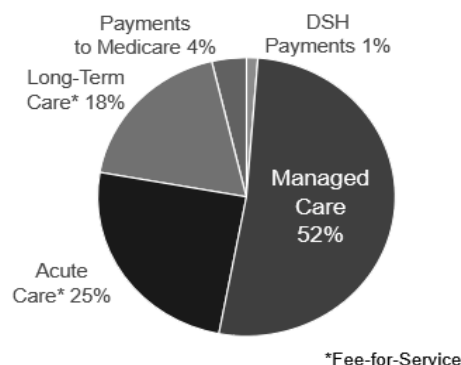
Medicare Vs. Medicaid
